#### **Christmas at Aylestone Baptist Church**

'Tis the season to be jolly, and this Christmas will be no exception at Aylestone Baptist Church. We invite you to join us as we joyfully celebrate the true meaning of Christmas and the significance of Christ's birth.

#### <u>Day 1</u>

We left for the Holy Land excited but apprehensive for what lay ahead. John had never been outside of Europe, although he had done so much research I felt as if I had my own personal tour guide! We landed safely and amazingly got through security and baggage claim within 30 minutes.

Our first adventure began when trying to get transport from the airport to our hotel in Jerusalem. Yom Kippur fell the day after we



arrived and it seemed as if everyone was trying to get into Jerusalem, 3 hours later we arrived tired and hungry and also with headaches from the constant beeping of car horns. This was something I think we ended up getting used to as it seems every driver in Israel, aside from being incredibly good at squeezing through small spaces, also use their car horns to communicate to other drivers. We still haven't decided if this was an angry communication or not!

#### <u>Day 2</u>

Today we walked for miles (a long way anyway) to discover how to get to places and what was where. We soon discovered that nothing is flat in Jerusalem. We started at the chapel of ascension - next door to our hotel, The Mount of Olives hotel. One of the places I was moved to tears.

We then walked to see the top of the Jewish graveyard - this is truly a remarkable area. The number of graves is phenomenal and even beyond where the vast majority are you still see some sporadically placed next to the main roads. The garden of Gethsemane was next, you really do get a sense of peace and tranquility here, no wonder this is was where our Lord spent time with his disciples.

From here we moved onto the Church of Nations and were lucky enough to be there during communion, a truly moving experience as the locals sang. We then stumbled across the Tomb of the Virgin Mary, under ground and very ornately decorated.

We had descended at this point so we now knew that we had to ascend to get to the old city and inside the walls. We entered eventually at the Western wall, here we separated as male and female enter the wall at separate sides. I sat and prayed for some time here and observed the other ladies who came to pray also, it was a humbling time. On the other side John touched the wall as there wasn't as many men at that moment in time as there was women. After a short walk we found somewhere to sit and have a drink to cool off. Continuing our journey we found the Christian Quarter and the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, which was another spiritually amazing place and again I was brought to tears.

We ended our day (after lots of walking) in a restaurant opposite the hotel.

#### <u>Day 3</u>

Today we went back along the path we walked the day before, our calves screaming at us! Entering by the Western Wall again we decided to walk onto Temple Mount. Although this is the place that holds the foundation stone I didn't get the same feelings as John did here, I guess that's the wonderful thing about faith and spirituality, its so very personal and isn't the same for us all.

From here we headed back towards the Christian Quarter and looked in some of the many shops and antiquity dealers in the area. We struck up quite a good relationship with one family and were invited to sit and drink outside, the drink being paid for by the owner, and watch the world go by. Here we met a lovely Christian couple who have messaged us everyday since. They are from an evangelical church in Hertfordshire, interestingly their names are Stanley and Dorothy!! God does move in mysterious ways sometimes. After our break here we moved on to Bethesda, where Jesus healed the lame man (John 5). I spent time sat in the shade meditating and reading John 5 whilst John walked around the area, it really was amazing to think we stood in places where our Lord and Saviour had been.

#### <u>Day 4</u>

We set out again on our trek down to the valley and up again (yes our calves screaming at us yet again!) Today we stopped at the tomb of the prophets and walked through by candle light. Our destination today was the City of David. We arrived after another trek down then up again then down again! Honestly nothing is flat!

I think to date what we did here is one of John and my best achievements. We walked through the remains of the city and taking in the atmosphere and what it might have been like in these times. We then had a choice to walk through tunnels, either a dry tunnel or a wet one. We videoed this and some of the commentary is quite funny. We opted for the wet tunnel and made our way

through just over a mile long of narrow, low and dark wet tunnel under the city of David. We were both so proud we had done this and someone even commented to John afterward that we would not be able to fit in there!!! He seemed quite surprised when we told him we had already done it! Once we'd dried out a bit we made our way back towards the western wall entrance and wanted to see the Jewish quarter, we found it and had one of the best meals we had during our time in the Holy land. Here we also saw the Golden Menorah which has been built in preparation for the building of the third temple. It is proudly displayed in a square within the Jewish quarter. An early night today as we have a trip booked for tomorrow and need to be at another hotel in the city for 07.30.

#### <u>Day 5</u>

Today we are off to Masada, Ein Gedi and the dead sea. A guided tour of these area's and we are up at 5am to make sure we are there in plenty of time. We have found where to get the bus from to take us there so walk to catch it. We do eventually get there and in plenty of time so then have to find somewhere to grab a drink as we were too early for breakfast in the hotel. Our trip is fabulous and our guide is amazing. The view from Masada was just awesome and some of the remains of the Roman ramp can be clearly seen. We were unable to do all of Ein Gedi due to rock slides but we did get to go under a beautiful waterfall and get photos taken, this was lovely and refreshing in the heat. The dead sea was also great if not a weird experience. John can't swim so I was highly entertained when he was floating away from me and panicking (he he!). A long but great day, so great we decided to book another tour via the same site for a trip tomorrow to Bethlehem, the river Jordan and Jericho. Another early night is we have the same meeting time tomorrow at the same place.

#### <u>Day 6</u>

Bethlehem was our first stop visiting the Shepherd's field, we then took a walk to the milky grotto and finally visited the nativity church. We were initially told that the grotto within the church of nativity would not be visited but we did get there relatively early and were able to get near the front of the queue. We were able to lay hands on the birth place of our Lord Jesus Christ, what an amazing experience that was too!

The river Jordan was next and we took a dip. One lady on our tour was baptised there, we didn't witness that but we did witness another baptism which moved me again to tears. I approached the lady afterwards to talk to her and it turned out that she had already been baptised at home - the Cook Islands. She wanted to reaffirm this as 4 years previously she had been given 2 weeks to live. She told me that through her faith in Jesus Christ she overcame her condition and had only just been given the all clear to fly. Oh how wonderful our Lord God is indeed! Amen!

Jericho was last on our tour and was also truly amazing. We saw the world's largest mosaic floor, recorded in the Guinness book of world records. We were both awestruck by how huge it was and also what condition it was in after all this time, a true wonder to behold. To see the number of layers that have been uncovered on top of Jericho was also incredible, to see entrances to houses that appeared to go underground too! What another fabulous day!

#### <u>Day 7</u>

Today I am feeling absolutely shattered so we had a lazier day and slept in a bit longer. We have done so much already but there is still so much to do! We had a day of walking around the old city today and looking in shops and stopping for food and drink. We eventually stumbled across the remnants of the Roman road that John had been wanting to show me, again the history was just amazing to see in the remains. We found a nice place to go out for dinner today to celebrate our time in Jerusalem, it was nice to get dressed up and enjoy a lovely meal.

#### <u>Day 8</u>

We have been walking down and up everyday and now our muscles are accustomed to it so we decided to put them to the test a bit more today! We have seen the Kidron Valley everyday we have made our way into the city so decided to walk it today. It is so peaceful and the underground tombs can be seen as you walk along the valley floor. We eventually come out next to the City of David, it is then that I realise we have a massive climb to get up to the top!! What feels like thousands of stairs later we reach the top and head in at the western wall entrance for the last time this trip.

We had such an amazing time, there is a lot more to say but I just don't have the space to put it all here! We did so much but also missed so much. We will be going back in the future but are so blessed that we were able to experience what we did and when we did. Had it have been a week later we may not have been here telling this story. By the grace of God we are able to though. Blessings to all Jo & John
