

Dear Church,

Lately we've been on a journey of "Following the Way" in our Sunday morning teaching series. We've been looking at how we follow Jesus, who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life (John 14:6).

On this journey, one insight we've come across is that early believers of Jesus referred to themselves as "followers of the Way" (see Acts 24:14). The term "Christian" was used by those outside of the faith (Acts 26:28), though today, of course it refers to those who follow Jesus. "Disciple" is a term found throughout the New Testament to describe these believers. But a more accurate translation might be "apprentice" - those who follow Jesus are His apprentices as they seek to live their lives in the way that He lived His.

But following Jesus and apprenticing Him isn't always easy, is it? A man once asked a mountain guide, "What's the hardest part of the climb?" The guide replied, "The part where you think it's over, but you're not at the top yet."

Discipleship is like that. Jesus calls us to follow Him—and the journey is not without its challenges. As I've shared in this teaching series, following Jesus isn't a formula, it's a process. It cannot be rushed, and it must be authentic. (Remember my story of thinking I could make compost in just one month?) Discipleship is a long journey of new life that takes us from the cross to the prize awaiting us in heaven.

In our journey of following the Way, we've discovered that it's not necessarily about doing more. Sometimes being with Jesus means doing less. Sometimes it means bringing Jesus into what we're already doing. But that's all part of making the sacrifices we need to be an apprentice.

Jesus said, "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me" (Luke 9:23). Remember that the cross was not just a burden—it was an instrument of death. Following Jesus means surrender, sacrifice, and suffering. It probably means giving up a harmful relationship, a bad habit, time spent on yourself, or even your possessions. Yet God will take those sacrifices and turn them into blessings.

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One of Jesus' earliest and most excited followers was Simon Peter. He was bold, passionate, and eager to prove his devotion. In the Gospels, Peter swore loyalty to Jesus, declaring that he would never abandon Him, even if all others did. Yet, in the darkness of Christ's approaching crucifixion, fear gripped him. As Jesus was led to trial, Peter stood nearby, only to deny his Lord three times. The cross exposed Peter's weakness, revealing that even the most devoted follower could fall.

But thankfully, that wasn't the end of the story for Peter. After Jesus rose from the dead, He sought Peter out—not to condemn him, but to restore him. On the shore of Galilee, Jesus asked Peter three times, "Do you love me?" With each answer, Peter was given a renewed call: "Feed my sheep." The cross had revealed Peter's failure, but the resurrection brought his restoration.

Easter morning changed everything for the disciples. The tomb was empty! Jesus had conquered sin and death. Peter, the same man who failed, was later restored and boldly preached at Pentecost (Acts 2:14). The power of the resurrection turned his defeat into victory. His journey from denial and defeat led him through suffering and shame and into restoration and rejoicing.

Easter reminds us that victory always comes. Paul writes, *"If anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!"* (2 Corinthians 5:17). Jesus didn't stay in the grave; neither should we stay in our failures or fears, our shame or sins. We are called to live in the power of His resurrection every day.

The cross wasn't the end of Jesus' story, and it's not the end of ours. This Easter, let's not just look back at what Christ did—let's move forward in this journey of new life He gives.

PATIO WORKS

The raised area at the side of the Church we called the Patio, over many years had become unsafe, inaccessible, un-useable and an eyesore. The Church has thought we should remove it for many years, so that the space could become useful.





It was such a big and daunting project that for many years it was always sidelined.

Over the past two or three years the Church revisited the idea, and funds became available thanks to some extremely generous donations, a grant from the Leicester City Council's Aylestone Ward Community Fund and some legacies.

So it was that in early February work started. The earth that was dug out filled more than 10 lorries each capable of carrying 20tonnes!





When all the earth was moved, the excavations had exposed the gas main from our meter in the garden, and the main electric cable. Both of these needed lowering substantially, so this was done

by specialist contractors – at additional cost!

The Church also decided to have the slabs in front of the Church re-laid as over the years these had become untidy and loose, so that many were broken and not level or in line – again additional cost.



We thank God that he has blessed the Church with sufficient funds to meet all the work that has been necessary, work is progressing well, and we look forward to the project being completed – and having pictures of the new completed area in the next edition!

Sigma update

Twenty years ago, in 2005, at the Baptist World Alliance Conference in Birmingham, I met a couple from India [Yesupadam and Sanjiva] on the towpath whilst walking between venues. They asked me to take their photo and we exchange email addresses. Contact in the following months told us of the amazing work they were doing based at Calvary Baptist Church in Akividu, India. Initially we personally sent some money to help their mission, and following their visit to us in UK, and a visit we made to India, we set up the Sigma [Supporting India Gospel Ministry Akividu] charity and invited friends and family to join us in supporting on a regular basis.

Since that time both Yesupadam and Sanjiva have died, but their sons Samuel and Sukumar and daughter in law Suguna are all trained Baptist Ministers and Sukumar and Suguna now lead the Church.

Their mission has grown and grown over the years in spite of much opposition. Their support of the marginalised poor is amazing. They work not only in Akividu, but in many small villages and hamlets, some of which are just grass huts with no services or security. We raised money to build a shelter for one of these settlements so they had somewhere to go when the annual monsoon floods came and flooded their huts or washed them away. This shelter is now one of the many new Churches they have planted over the last few years. Sukumar and Suguna took on a huge responsibility when their father died, and they say that without the support and prayers of Sigma they might not have managed. They work so very hard every day.

Yesupadam was a man of vision and, was convinced that God wanted them to build a new Church bigger than the upstairs 'Prayer Hall' they used. This always seemed out of reach, but over the past couple of years, the prayer hall became unstable due to water getting into the reinforcement in the walls, and so they were told that it was unsafe to use for large gatherings. The only solution was to erect a new building next door. The update in the last magazine showed progress they had made.

Yesupadam also had a vision that the ministry should offer medical support to the many poor who couldn't afford to pay when they were ill. So he hoped that his grand-daughters, Sukumar's daughters, would train to become doctors who could then work in the ministry.

One of those daughters is now completing training in the Philippines whilst the other has been accepted in a regional medical school to train.

With all the costs of the new building etc. they will be struggling to help to pay for the costs both their daughters are facing, and having to take out loans – maybe we could help to sponsor some of their costs. Please see Stanley if you are interested in supporting Sigma.

She wandered in the garden sunlight dappled through the copse. When she spotted a familiar gardener there, And asked him, "Please sir tell me if you've moved and if so, where?

"Mary" said the figure, and hairs stood up on her head, "Rabboni, oh my master, is it you Lord, it can't be cos you're dead?" "Mary, I have risen, Just as I told you all I would, Did you think that death could hold me? Of course, it never Could."

Mary's mind was all a flutter, was he real or just a ghost? Was she dreaming or imagining, had it happened what she wanted most? Jesus told her not to hold him but to run and tell the rest, That he'd risen, hallelujah! Christ is risen he's the best.

Mary's feet barely touched the ground as she sped back with her news, That Jesus Christ is risen, to banish all their blues. He lives today and for those who trust and serve him. He is everything and more, the risen saviour conquered sin.

- God won't ask why it took you so long to seek Him; He'll lovingly take you into His Kingdom, not leave you at the gates of Hell.

The Sacrificial Offering....

I'll never forget Easter 1946. I was 14, my little sister May was 12 and my older sister, Susan, 16. We lived at home with our mum, and the 4 of us knew what it was to do without many things after our dad died 5 years previously.

A month before Easter the Pastor of our church announced that a special Easter offering would be taken to help a poor family. He asked everyone to save and give sacrificially.



When we got home, we talked about what we could do. We decided to buy a sack of potatoes and live on them for a month, donating what we saved on our weekly shop. Susan got as many cleaning jobs as she could, and I babysat for neighbours. May ran errands and walked dogs as she really loved dogs – and walking!

Every day we counted the coins to see how much we had saved, and talk about how the poor family were going to enjoy having the money the church would give them. We had about 80 people in the church so there would be a really good total – after all the Pastor reminded everyone each Sunday to save for the Sacrificial Offering.

The day before Easter came – we could hardly believe it – we had raised £80. Susan and I went to the Post Office to exchange our coins for four twenty pound notes. That night, we could hardly sleep. We didn't care that we had no new clothes for Easter – we had £80 for the Sacrificial Offering.

As we sat in church I heard some teenagers sniggering that the Robertson girls had on their old dresses. I looked at them in their new outfits but I didn't care, I was happy.

When the Sacrificial Offering was taken we each, mum, Susan, May and I, put a twenty pound note into the offering bag.

As we walked home from Church that Easter Sunday morning, we sang again those wonderful Easter hymns.

Later that afternoon the Pastor drove up in his car. Mum went to the door, talked with him a moment, then came back with an envelope in her hand. We asked what it was, but she didn't say a word. As she opened it out fell four £20 notes. No-one spoke. She just put the money back into the envelope.

That Easter Day I found out we were poor. Mum asked what we wanted to do with the money. We didn't know. We'd never known we were poor. We didn't want to go to Church the next Sunday, but mum said we had to, and as we walked along our eyes were cast down, and we didn't sing.

At church we had a Missionary Speaker. He talked about churches in Africa made out of sun dried bricks, but they needed money to buy roofs. £100 would buy a roof. The Pastor said, "Can't we all sacrifice to help these poor people?" We looked at each other and smiled for the first time in a week.

When the offering was counted, the Pastor announced there was a little over £100. The Missionary was thrilled, he hadn't expected such a large offering from our small church. He said, "You must have some rich people in this church."

Suddenly it struck us. We had given £80 of that "little over £100". We were the rich family. Hadn't the missionary said so.

From that day on I've never been poor again. I've always remembered how rich I am because I have Jesus.
